Schedule - 19: Notes On Accounts

Significant Accounting Policies.

i) Method of Accounting -

The accounts have been prepared generally on cash system of accounting.

ii) Fixed Assets -

Fixed Assets are valued at cost less Depreciation.

iii) Depreciation -

Depreciation has been provided as per Written Down Value Method.

iv) Donations -

Corpus donations received during the year are added to the respective funds and not considered as part of the income of the Trust. All non-corpus Donations are treated as income of the Trust. Specific Donations received for identified projects are treated as income of the year in which the project is implemented.

v) Lotus Home -

In case of Lotus Home for old aged women, the amount received as Deposit from the residents are accounted as per the approved scheme and agreement with the residents as follows:

- (a) Rs.3.00.000/- a non refundable Deposit is considered as contribution towards M.S.W.C. Lotus Home Platinum Jubilee Fund in the year of admission, interest being used towards running of the project.
- (b) Rs.1.45.000/- or Rs.1.67.000/- (As per respective 'Declaration cum Undertaking') per annum is adjusted towards annual expenses for stay charges being contribution from residents in Lotus Home.

- 2. The Trust has maintained Investments Register showing full particulars of investments, which have been physically verified by the Trustees and there are no discrepancies. In the opinion of the Trustees which is relied upon by the auditors, there is no impairment in the value of investments as disclosed in the Balance Sheet.
- 3. During the year, interest free advances are given to employees which are temporary in nature.
- 4. The balance in various Earmarked Funds were not represented by corresponding Earmarked Investments. Hence the interest on the investments are not credited to the respective Fund accounts but credited to the Income & Expenditure Account.
- 5. The allocation of expenses and appropriation of income to various projects / grants to be taken as certified by the management and relied upon by the auditors.
- 6. Interest received by the various committees / projects on Corpus fund from Maharashtra State Women's Council is taken as per the calculations done by the trustees of Maharashtra State Women's Council and relied upon by the auditors.
- 7. Council staff working on various projects is included in the educational object as project-wise bifurcation is not feasible.
- 8. Previous year figures have been regrouped wherever necessary to make them comparable with those for the current year.

Asha Sadan - Literally means House of Hope - is a warm and caring 100 year old children's home that provide shelter and protection to committed and abandoned children and teenaged girls fleeing from abusive circumstances trained staff take care of the infants/children and young girls with a view to rendering them to a mentally and physically healthy condition. Education and Vocational training is provided to all as the main objective is to reintegrate them into society. The government gives a small annual grant for this project. This year Asha Sadan will be celebrating their Centenary year.

Adoption - The Adoption Group's aim, like all other institutions within the MSWC is to work tirelessly against the permanent institutionalisation of young children. In society on the one hand there are a number of childless couples who are eager to become parents and on the other hand we find numerous orphans who are in need of family support. The adoption group works as a mediator between the two, and brings joy to both. The group works in accordance with rules and regulation framed by Central Adoption Resource Agency (CARA). Differently-abled children are also placed in adoptive homes, usually overseas. Several children thus adopted contact the Council through social media to search their roots.

Asha Kiran (Street Children Project) -

Asha Kiran, which operates in premises adjacent to Asha Sadan in Dongri area in Central Mumbai provides a Day Care and Learning shelter for 80 street children. It aims to care for and provide development of children within their environment through education, vocational learning and social studies teaching them the basis of health and hygiene, and developing in them a sense of self-respect. These are children who would otherwise spend time on the streets of the city, begging or other undesirable activities or be under constant threat of exploitation. Asha Kiran works on the simple principle that they deserve better and is a tribute to their resilience and their ability to thrive with a little care and nurturing. The centre also runs a night shelter for 25 girls.

Bapnu Ghar - Father's Home. A safe and secure haven for women round the clock temporary shelter for women in social distress irrespective of their age, caste and creed. It is a home for those women who have nowhere else to go. Married women and widows or young girls who are victims of domestic violence can walk into Bapnu Ghar at any time of the day or night and are given shelter immediately. Family counselling and legal aid is offered to those who are in need of it. As it is a short stay home police cases also are given admission.

Abhilasha Centre - Is located in the largest slum in Asia namely Dharavi. A Balwadi is run here for the underprivileged slum area. Every year over 200 children take advantage

of this facility. Nutritious meal is served to them along with fun play activities and education. Vocational training is given to young girls and women in tailoring so that they can earn their livelihood. A study centre is operated in the evening for students to study under supervision.

Savera Committee - Center and Sheltered Workshop is an institution which serves the differently abled underprivileged children. A day care centre for young children and vocational training as well as a sheltered workshop is made available for the older ones. Nutritious meal are given daily. Various activities like music, yoga and dancing are conducted by trained teachers as therapeutic sessions for them. Now Home Science is also one of their activities. In the workshop they are taught to make useful articles which are then exhibited at different exhibitions. Part of the proceeds are given to these children as stipend. This gives them necessary confidence and reduces burden on their families.

Foster Care Committee - It works on the philosophy that children are best nurtured in their own homes. This project is funded jointly by the Council and Directorate of Women and Child Welfare Board, Govt. of Maharashtra. Foster Care Committee identifies families, especially single parents who face financial problems and require assistance to educate their children. Typically these are circumstances due to ill health, death of an earning member and no one to

care for the children. Several Foster Care beneficiaries have graduated and secured decent jobs, thus making this a very successful project of the Council. This project has completed 50 years this year.

Free Public Library at Worli - The Directorate of Libraries, gives a grant to the Council for this project. It offers a well-stocked library for use of students and adults who wish to come and read. The Library has a large collection of books in English, Hindi and Marathi. Reference books for under graduate and post graduate students are available. This is a boon for underprivileged students and people of nearby localities.

Study Centre - Which operates as an extension of the library and free reading room has gained tremendous popularity among students of nearby areas. More than 1000 students have registered here and many of them come here every day to study in peace and comfort. This Centre is run with the financial support provided by the Mahindra Group.

Lotus Home for Senior Women Citizen -

Paid home that offers a very safe, secure and comfortable life for vulnerable senior women. This is a 16 bedded residential home for women above 65 years of age, who can be admitted on a short term and long term basis.

Funds Committee - Every project of social work needs money for successful

running. Major source of funding for the Kiran (Street Children Project) it is proposed Council is Corporate and Individual donations. Besides, Fund Raising events are also organised.

The website of the Council is regularly accessed by hundreds of people all over the world. Our Facebook page is very popular and keeps donors well-wishers and supporters constantly updated about the Council and its activities and achievements. It is an excellent platform to reach out to bigger and more varied sections of society.

Bapnu Ghar - Father's Home A safe and Secure Haven for women in social distress and in moral danger. Established in 1953 by Mr. Manu Subedar of the Lotus Trust, its management in 1956 was handed over to MSWC. Bapnu Ghar provides immediate temporory shelter to any woman regardless her caste or creed at any time of day or night.

Bapnu Ghar has 3 sections - Residential, Non Residential and Extension.

I) **Residential** - A women in social distress that is a woman with adjustment problems with her family members and is ill-treated by her family. As she cannot leave her young children at home, she is allowed to bring children under the age of 6 with her. On arrival she is interviewed by a trained social worker and sent to a Public Hospital such as K.E.M/Poddar for check-up and if necessary, for treatment. During their stay women and their husband's families are counselled by qualified Social Workers, tested by the Psychologist and treated by the Psychiatrist for depression and minor ailments. Their husband are also counselled, and treated for alcoholism and drug addiction. The Alcoholics Anonymous Members come twice a month to encourage the husbands to attend their meeting.

As the main of aim of Bapnu Ghar is reconciliation Legal Separation / Divorce is considered as a last resort. Two Lawyers are attached to Bapnu Ghar, one deals with marital discord cases, maintenance, divorce, restitution of conjugal rights, custody of children etc. and the second lawyer handles domestic violence cases. Depending on their aptitude and capability Bapnu Ghar sponsors residents for courses conducted by outside agencies. This enable them to be financially independent.

During the year 2020-2021, 52 inquiries were received. There were 08 existing cases with 01 child, thereafter 21 new cases, and 03 children were admitted, 20 women and 01 child were discharged.

II) Non Residential - It has a Family Counselling Service for non-residential cases of women in social distress. These clients are given free advice and guidance through trained Social Workers to solve their problems. Men also avail this service. Here too, legal aid is given where required.

During the the year 2020-2021, 42 inquiries were received. There were 28 new cases and 22 active cases.

III) Extension Department : This facility is available to girls and women in social distress who have jobs but no support system and stay till alternative arrangements are made. Similar facilities are also given to them. A nominal

amount is taken for their boarding and lodging.

During the period there were 10 existing cases and 00 new admission and 07 were discharged.

Bapnu Ghar Activities:

- a) Activities carried out at Bapnu Ghar as part of Therapy, Recreation and Rehabilitation:
- ♦ Bapnu Ghar provided masks, sanitizers to residents during pandemic period of Covid-19. As per the advise of Dr. Ami Dhariya, residents started taking turmeric milk and sweet lemon juice for improving their level of Vitamin C and D.
- Online and in person Yoga and meditation sessions were conducted for residents to relieve their stress during pandemic period.
- Residents were given psychiatric treatment who were in stress and depression during pandemic period.
- Depending on their aptitude and capability, Bapnu Ghar residents are sent for courses conducted by outside agencies, to enable them to become financially independent.
- ♦ To enhance their self-confidence, they are guided on the basics of how to conduct themselves at job interviews. Assistance is provided to residents particularly who wishes to work with jobs and ensures that the job is in a safe environment.
- ◆ Different festivals are celebrated like Diwali, Christmas, Makar Sankranti etc.
- ♦ Independence Day and Republic Day were celebrated with Lotus Home residents.

Other Activities of Bapnu Ghar:

M.S.W.C.

- a) Bapnu Ghar has been closed to new admissions and outsiders throughout the lockdown. All possibilities precautions were taken, masks and sanitizers have been provided to the beneficiaries and residents during pandemic period.
- b) India having been in lockdown since 22nd March 2021, these have been difficult times. The task of getting essential and provisions was greatly facilitated by the kind and generous donations that Bapnu Ghar received from and through members, Officer Bearers, individuals, Lotus Home Trust and the Garware Trust. Special mention must be made of Ms. Raheen Jumani's and Runwal builder's efforts.

Bapnu Ghar places on record our grateful thanks to The Lotus Trust, Garware Charitable Trust, Mr. Chandravadan Vora, Mr. Aban Ranina, Bedekar & Sons, District Women and Child Welfare Development, Police and all our donors for their support and co-operation.

SAVERA COMMITTEE

Maharashtra State Women's Council runs Savera Centre for differently abled children. We give counselling, training in skill development and cultural activities. Due to the pandemic lockdown the centre has not reopened in June 2020. Regular classes are conducted online by Savera teachers via Google meets.

Report of Activities:

SAVERA CENTRE runs 2 projects for the differently abled children. 1. Day Care Centre 2. Sheltered Workshop

1) Day Care Centre : Age Group 7 To 15 years I.Q. 40 to 70 No. of students 9.

Children taught functional academic reading, writing, identifying colours general knowledge, art, crafts, music, sports, yoga, home science, shapes & sizes and basic home science & computer by special educator.

A. Pre-Vocational Centre:

Age Group 15 To 18 years I.Q. 40 to 70 No. of students 4.

This centre caters to children who are given orientation to work in the sheltered workshop to develop vocational skills.

2) Sheltered Workshop: Age Group above 18 up to 40 years I.Q. 40 to 70 No. of Students 28.

We train in 4 different areas.

M.S.W.C.

A) Craft : All children are taught paper folding, cutting, envelope making, painting variety of diyas, making fancy paper bags etc.

- **B) Stitching:** As per their ability, students are taught to stitch aprons, towels and cotton bags.
- **C) Duster:** All children are trained to make dusters according to their I.Q level.
- **D) Home Science:** Children are taught to prepare simple eatables. The main objective is to orient them in basic things like holding knife, peeling, cleaning of vegetables, lighting the gas, identifying masala and spices etc.

Highlights of the Activities : Cultural

In view of the pandemic and current situation, the Annual Day programme was not held in April, 2020.

'Concern India Foundation' organized an Online painting competition on 24th and 25th August, 2020.

18 children participated and won prizes.

FOSTER CARE COMMITTEE (FCC)

The Foster Care Committee was started in 1970. The Foster Care Committee sponsors the education of an underprivileged child until he or she completes the 12th Std or completes 18 years. These children either have only one parent, or terminally ill parents. Such people find it extremely difficult to pay the house rent, provide food and educate their children. More often than not, these children are pulled out of school and put to work to augment the family income. Sometimes, old and feeble grandparents are unable to cope with the raising of their grandchildren. The Foster Care Programme undertakes to support the education of 1 child from such a family.

Foster Care

The Foster Care Committee have 43 children under the 'Bal Sangopan Yojana'.

278 children are sponsored by private donors.

The sponsorship amount for one child is Rs.7,000/- per annum and it is continued till the child completes Std XII.

Currently we have 321 children under our umbrella.

We are pleased to announce that the academic year 2019-2020 has been very heartening. 48 children appeared for Std X, out of that 45 passed and 26 got Ist class. 38 children appeared for Std XII, out of that 29 passed and 8 got Ist class. The children who have failed have been motivated to make a second attempt.

Other Activities:

Due to the lock down we were unable to collect the mark sheet of children. So we contacted all the children & gathered the information about their studies and situation in their family. The studies were conducted online by the schools and class authorities.

The Inner Wheel Club of B'bay Bayview arranged a competition 'Essay writing, drawing etc'. 31 children participated and 3 got prizes. This competition was held on WhatsApp.

The Inner Wheel Club of B'bay Bayview arranged an elocution competition. 4 children participated and 2 got prizes. This competition was held on WhatsApp.



LIBRARY COMMITTEE

Maharashtra State Women's Council runs free open access Public Library and Reading Room at Nari Khandelwal Sadan - Worli on all days of the week including Sundays. This library is used by people from all walks of life such as students of all ages, house wives, people working in offices. There are books in Marathi, Hindi and English, This library is popular amongst students as it is a quiet place to study and prepare for their examinations.

The Library has books on wide range of subjects such as Literature, Management, Biographies of famous personalities and Personality Development. We also have books on various competitive exams and Career guidance. These include international bestsellers, popular books and also books suggested by readers and students. We encourage readers to read novels written on basis of real life situation, as these books are treasure trove of knowledge and help for personality development. New books are added during the course of the year. The library now has 39173 books including 780 children's books. We also subscribe to 54 periodicals and 22 newspapers.

In course of the year Library Committee organized several activities, competitions, for the benefit of readers and students. Competitions for school children were held in December 2020 on Essay writing, Drawing,

Hand writing, Rangoli, Storytelling etc. Children participated with enthusiasm in these programmes. On 16th January 2021 Annual Prize Distribution Function was held for the winners of these competitions.

Highlights of activities during the year:

- 1. Programme on birth anniversary of former President of India Dr. Abdul Kalam was done online on 15th October 2020.
- 2. On 4th August 2020 Vanamotsava was observed by planting saplings in the library compound.

The attendance during the year is approx 3177 people used the library. A total of 385 books are issued for reading. It is guiet a pleasure to see the main hall of the library filled with students engrossed in studying and reading in pin drop silence. Library now has internet facility. This has helped to catalogue all the library books on the internet.

Our library is open from 10 am to 7 pm and study centre which is on 2nd floor of the library building is open from 6.30 pm to 10 pm. Students have a guiet and comfortable place to devote time to their studies right from 10 am to 10 pm. But this year library and Study Centre were closed from March 2020 to July 2020 because of Pandemic as per instruction received from Directorate of Libraries.



LOTUS HOME COMMITTEE

A Home away from home is a short and long term residential facility for Senior Citizen (women) over 65 years of age. The sixteen rooms are well furnished, spacious and comfortable, at present 16 rooms are occupied. All efforts are made to provide quality service including in-house catering, house-keeping etc. at nominal rates. The residents are provided in house catering where each one is provided the * opportunity to fix a monthly menu.

In the year 2020 unfortunately 2 residents passed away.

We have 5 new residents.

- Jaslok Hospital and Bhatia Hospital continue to give emergency admission to residents of Lotus Home.
- Tops line Ambulance service continues to provide their services as and when required by the residents.
- Medical records and files of each resident.

is kept in their individual rooms, the same is up-dated regularly.

- Festivals such as Navratri, Diwali and Christmas & New Year's eve party were celebrated. Residents enjoyed and participated happily.
- On 15th August 2020, Copper Chimney hosted a buffet lunch to all residents.

ASHA KIRAN (STREET CHILDREN PROJECT)

Asha Kiran (Street Children Project) situated in Dongri giving shelter for around 120 street children, 80 are registered and 40 temporary. This is a project that provides a day centre for the children of pavement dwellers. These children are registered at the centre and enrolled in nearby schools or colleges. These children go to school. When the school closes for the day and when their parents are still busy working, they come to the centre. We give them food, shelter and help them do their home work. We also conduct classes on arts, music, yoga dance etc., to develop different skills in them. They go back to their parents by the time they return from their work. A few children stav overnight.

The primary aim is to provide for the development of children within their environment and without losing parental contact. They are given formal education and/or vocational training according to their age and aptitude. They are also taught the basics of health, hygiene and good manners. These are children who would otherwise be begging or pursue other undesirable activities or be under constant threat of exploitation. All the children are provided nutritious, balanced meals regularly and medical treatments are arranged when required. Weekly medical check-ups are also done by a qualified member.

Activities during the year

The Centre remained closed from 20th of March 2020 due to the Lockdown for the day care children. The Night Shelter for girls was also closed from the 30th of April 2020.

The Centre was opened for the Night Shelter girls from 10 February 2021.

The Staff at the Centre are regularly attending from 17th November 2020. The Covid-19 protocol is being strictly followed.

The interior of the centre, including all bath rooms and toilets were repaired and painted before the night shelter restarted. The plastering, water proofing and painting of the external wall will be done as and when we get funds.

Achievements:

7 children appeared for the S.S.C. Board exam in 2020. 2 Children scored above 61% and one student Ganesh Adhalrao scored 91% at the S.S.C. Board Exam. He came first among all Municipal Schools in Mumbai City. He is studying further for higher education at Poddar College. Financial help has been organised for his higher study. One Student passed the 12th Board Exam.

Extra-Curricular Activities:

As the centre remained closed due to the Covid pandemic we are sorry to report there were no activities during this period.

Activities conducted by Members/ Volunteers

Our Volunteers and Members teach Maths, Science, Life Skills, General Knowledge to the children.

Vocational Training:

Vocational training for girls in embroideries and tailoring classes, and advanced course in computers for those children who have completed the Basic course, which are in our syllabus, got interrupted as the centre was closed due to Covid pandemic, when the centre reopens these classes will also resume.

ADOPTION GROUP

Project Background : To place relinquished or abandoned children, declared legally free for adoption, into homes with families referred by Central Adoption Resource Authority, Delhi.

Adoptions: Children adopted during the year totaled 12. (Up to 17/03/2021)

Lockdown and travel restrictions for most part of the year on account of the global Covid19 pandemic, affected our work schedule and number of adoptions this year.

Root Search: Children adopted years ago are happy to come and meet us, and we provide them with whatever information that is possible.

Project Background : To place of pre and post adoptive parents and children relinquished or abandoned children, declared is carried out whenever the need arises.

Follow-up reports: Post--adoption follow-up visits to homes of children adopted within Mumbai are carried out by us. In turn, we call for reports from out-station adoption agencies, of our children placed outside of Mumbai region.

DWCD, SARA & FAA Meetings: are regularly attended by us in order to keep abreast of the changes in policies and procedures. Suggestions & representations on related matters have been voiced by us a these meetings. On account of the pandemic, Zoom webinars were organised this year by CARA & SARA for the benefit of the agencies.

ABHILASHA GROUP

Brief Background of the Project:

Maharashtra State Women's Council - Abhilasha, at Padmavati Saraiya Kendra has completed 75 years. The members of the Council started this project in the year 1946 to promote education, health and all round development of the women and children among the Laborers, who came from the villages to work in the Mills of Mumbai and settled in this area of Dharavi - Asia's largest slum.

This year has been an unusual year from March 2020 we have been under threat of Covid and Lockdown. The Balwadi has been closed on Government instruction. Hopefully we shall be fully functional in the next academic year.

The girl - education dropout rate is still there, with many girls leaving school after the 7th or 8th class. We at Abhilasha are trying to empower them with skills, so that they become independent and earn a living for themselves, and for this we have a Sewing Class where we are preparing our girls for the Government Diploma and Certificate in Sewing. The sewing class became operative from November 2020, maintaining strict Covid Guidelines of Social Distancing. On February 19 we gave sewing machines to the two girls who passed their sewing exams last year. This will help them to become independent and motivate them to follow this skill as their career. We are happy to report that they have shown interest to take the next level test if the classes are in this area. We are exploring this possibility. Two girls had filled the form for the examination to be held in 2021. but this prize distribution ceremony motivated two more girls to decide to appear for the

examination. So we shall be sending 4 girls for the examination in the next academic year.

Dharavi is the largest slum in Asia. The houses are small and congested making it very difficult for the children to study. Hence Abhilasha runs a study centre for these children where they study and revise do their homework in comfort and congenial atmosphere. We have at present about 17 children taking benefit of this scheme despite of the Covid scare. Here too Hygiene and Social distancing norms and wearing masks are strictly adhered too.

The Girl dropout rate is still high and so to encourage girls to complete SSC we are giving them Miss. Sarla Sheth award to the girl who gets the highest mark in SSC every year. Hopefully the SSC examinations will be held this year and we shall be giving this award to a girl from Dharavi in 2021.

All other activities have been kept on hold and we are on maintenance mode. Hoping and praying that this unusual phase will soon be over and we shall all be able to resume our normal activity.

Future plans: We would like to increase our beneficiaries, and start more courses for developing income generating skills for the community of Dharavi. For this we are looking for sponsors and the new activities will take shape once the funds are arranged.
